She thought, therefore, that if she sat amidst those who were endowed with the splendors of the world, they would say to her: Go to the place which your poverty assigns you. What! the wife of a common workman to presume to sit amongst the noble ones of Israel!

"She had the right to place herself among those virgins who were consecrated to God, because she was the most excellent of them all. But then these would have said: How can you dare to place yourself amongst us, seeing that you have a husband and child?

"She went, therefore, and sat down among the poor, whom the world has always despised. Then was fulfilled the prophecy of the Book of Canticles: As the lily among the thorns, so is my Beloved amongst the daughters of Israel.

My child, since the virtue of humility was so dear to Our Lady, and so much recommended by her beloved Son Jesus, the more you endeavor to practice it, the dearer you will become to them.

Such is the commentary of Cornelius à Lapide.

St. Peter Damian tells us the same: "The Lord, as soon as He was suspended upon the cross, drew all men to Himself through a loving desire."

Return Love for Love:

And who is there, Cornelius goes on to say, that will not love Jesus, who dies for love of us? "For who will not reciprocate the love of Christ, who dies out of love for us?"

Behold, O redeemed souls (as Holy Church exhorts us), behold your Redeemer upon that

cross, where His whole form breathes love, and invites you to love Him:

His head bent downwards to give us the kiss of peace,

His arms stretched out to embrace us, His heart open to love us: "

"His whole figure" (as St. Augustine says) "breathes love, and challenges us to love him in return: his head bent downwards to kiss us, his hands stretched out to embrace us, his bosom open to love us."
